Orford Town Hall, situated in the heart of this historical Suffolk village, provides an ideal setting for all manner of events, both for local residents and those from further afield.

The original building, dating back to 1902, has been developed to provide a venue for a great variety of uses from theatre productions, dinners, dances, receptions, sports ... the list is as long as one could wish.

Modernised to provide facilities for the 21st century, the function centre is well equipped with dining tables and chairs, crockery, cutlery and commercial standard kitchen and catering facilities.



The Main Hall is licensed for dining and dancing for 120 people and can accommodate up to 200. Modern, smaller function rooms are available for a variety of uses and can accommodate up to 80 people or less when divided.









Orford is rich in history both ancient and modern. Orford Castle with its well preserved keep was built by King Henry II between 1165 and 1173.

The Church of St Bartholomew is the same date as the castle and an Augustinian Friary dates back to 1285.



Situated on the River Ore, the town was an important port in the 13th century and has Charters from King Henry III in 1256, and sent two Members of Parliament to Westminster between 1306 and 1832. It achieved the status of a Chartered Borough in the reign of Elizabeth I in 1579.

Orford Quay, now mainly used by fishing boats and sailing and leisure craft, provides the access by river to Orford Ness and Havergate Island, the RSPB nature reserve.



Orford Ness, a vegetated shingle spit stretching from Aldeburgh past Orford to Shingle Street, was used as an early airfield, the home for experimental radar and a weapons research establishment during and after the Second World War. Weapons testing was conducted there until the 1980s.
